The 2003 Annual Meeting of Pinewood Lake was held on December 1st, with 84 Association members present.

A motion to approve the adoption of a three-way stop at the corner of Lake Park Drive and Lawrence Street failed by a tie vote.

There were 127 Outstanding Home Awards presented by the Architectural Control Committee (ACC), Liz Crowley, Chair, and the ACC Administrator, Syl O'Leary.

The President of the Board, Mike Shigley, read the names of all of our community volunteers; members of the Hospitality, Nominations, Pool, Architectural Control, Maintenance, Security, Marketing, Publications, and Finance Committees, Needle Delivery Group, and Election Tellers. The Board of Directors recognized Arthur Guilani for his outstanding contribution to the community this year for developing the PLHA website. Mirelle Lowe was thanked for eighteen years of service to Pinewood Lake as the Saturday office assistant. Kirsten Davis and Charlotte Gallagher were also recognized for their excellent performance.

Committee chairpersons reviewed their 2003 committee highlights: Nancy Razzino, Pool; Liz Crowley, ACC; Frank Holub,

Maintenance; Ginger Krup, Security; Roger Reutershan, Marketing; and Sonny Jones, Publications.

Jack Kaufman, Treasurer, reported the proposed 2004 budget is balanced and the Reserve Account is continuing to increase with 60% of the Reserve Study requirements currently funded.

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percent of eligible voters are required for a quorum at a first meeting; and one-half of the number of votes cast at the preceding meeting are required for a quorum at succeeding meetings.) Therefore, to hold the election, 279 proxies were needed (60%). As there were only 186 eligible votes cast, this fell far short of a quorum and the meeting was recessed until December 15th.

The Continuation of the Annual Meeting, on December 15th, reconvened with 24 association members present. By the second meeting, the number of eligible voters had grown to 481, and 14 additional votes had been cast, raising the total votes to 200. Since only 145 ballots (30%) were needed for a quorum at the second meeting, the tallying of the votes proceeded. According to the recently revised Policy Resolution 2003-05, three election inspectors (Kirsten Davis, Jane Palazzolo, and Stephen Pratt) were selected at random from those eligible members present.

Four members were elected to the Board of Directors. Votes were cast for:

Mark your calendar for January 22nd, 2004, at 7:30 PM, to attend the first Marketing Group meeting of the New Year. Next, please write down one or two items that could help the community's marketing efforts. Do these two important actions, plus participate in our agenda setting discussions and you are on board the Marketing Group's fast train for 2004.

Our efforts in the new year can be pace-setting for the community. The past twelve months have been very good for Pinewood Lake in the market place. Home values and demand have risen, and continue to rise. We are positioned to start the spring selling season with enhanced prices and no lagging inventory. With mortgage rates continuing at the 6% level, employment rates rising, and area demand high, it is plausible that we could reach the \$290,000 selling price plateau before this year's end. **HOWEVER**, and this a big IF, in order for us to achieve and exceed this price level, several actions must continue to occur:

- ✓ Maintain and improve our property's curb appeal,
- ✓ Maintain the community's common infrastructure (the lake, streets, parks and pool), and (most of all),
- ✓ *Enforce our existing rules*

Survey after survey shows that home buyers want to be impressed by what they see, and want control of the quality and character of the place they call "home."

The marketing efforts for the new year tentatively include working with the Fairfax County Water Authority to obtain a matching grant to help aerate the water in our lake. This action could mean installing at reduced or no cost to us the much needed lake water fountains. These fountains would not only improve our lake's water quality but also add beauty to the surroundings. We are equally interested in

working with the Fairfax County staff and the developer of the proposed "Main Street Project" to ensure traffic, storm water drainage, parking, and perimeter buffer structures are addressed in such a way as to add value to our community and not detract from it. There is also considerable interest in seeking other sources of income for this community as we aim to improve our competitive position in the market place. Another possible project for the group is to conduct a community-wide marketing survey of our residents to better define our purchasing power, unique needs and interests in order to help attract more advertisers for our critical publications.

If any of this interests you, come join us on the 22nd of January at the Community Center. Your ideas are valuable to us! We'll keep a chair at the table for you!

Harry Houseowner Hints

- ✓ It's not too late to turn off your outdoor faucets! We will be getting cold weather in January and having frozen pipes in the first floor walls can be very messy! Why not do it now? Don't just turn off the valve - drain the pipe too !!!
- ✓ With the heating season upon us . . . remember to change your furnace filters about once a month. If you have a washable filter - wash it as recommended by the manufacturer. It will cut down on dust and help your furnace move air more freely throughout your house.
- ✓ Also, reverse your air flow in the house. Heat rises! Shut down the number of air vents open on the third floor and open ones on the first floor. In the summer, reverse the order. Cold air is heavy and settles downward.

MESSAGE FROM LEE DISTRICT**SUPERVISOR DANA KAUFFMAN**

Everyone agrees that we have too much traffic. After that, it gets more complicated. We must juggle moving vehicles, limited funding sources, clean air requirements, protection of neighborhoods, and other environmental concerns.

By now you have probably heard or read about a proposal to add 'HOT' lanes to the Beltway. At its December 8th meeting, the Board of Supervisors endorsed the concept while asking that better transit access be built into the design. The HOT (for High Occupancy Toll) lane project under evaluation by the Virginia Department of Transportation is a private sector project that would add four lanes (two in each direction) to the middle of the Beltway. The lanes would mostly fit within the existing right-of-way, limiting the impact on neighborhoods and minimizing costs. Most of the construction costs would be covered by revenue bonds funded by tolls.

Buses and high occupancy vehicles would be able to use the HOT lanes at no charge; all other vehicles would pay a toll. Tolls would vary by time of day, with higher rates during peak periods, thus using price sensitivity to limit congestion. Drivers would use 'Smart Tag' readers to prepay tolls, thus eliminating the traffic 'cork' that usually comes with toll booths.

THE "NOT PERFECT" WILL KEEP US MOVING

The HOT Lane concept is not a magic bullet that will slay our traffic monsters. Indeed, there are good arguments against the proposal. Most who oppose the project would prefer light rail along the same right-of-way. Those strongly supporting HOT Lanes want something done sooner rather than later and see this project as the only financially viable option to unblocking rush hour traffic.

I support the HOT Lane project with the caveat that it needs to be reworked to ensure it supports transit. Done properly, the project would offer a viable Fredericksburg-Springfield-Tyson's link that would be an economical alternative to the 'Purple Line' extension of

Metro.

Bus service on the HOT lanes (tied to Franconia-Springfield's Metro Station, VRE Station and parking structures) would let us link Metro's Blue and Orange lines at only the cost of bus ramp connections to and from the HOT lanes. As an added bonus, we could use the project to link our VRE commuter rail system to both Metro rail lines.

Dedicated ramps would also give us a timesaving incentive to leave our cars at home and hop a bus to Metro's Orange Line and Tyson's Corner. At the same time, folks at the other end of the line would have a transit link to jobs in our community. Investors looking to get in on Springfield's future would have a new incentive to make community-desired redevelopment happen.

No single project is magically going to make gridlock disappear. We need creative solutions and the Beltway HOT Lanes project could well be one - IF it is modified to include the missing transit links. We could actually see some real improvements within the next decade.

Jay Matthews 2003 Challenge Index Places Mount Vernon High School in the Top 4% of the Nation

Observations from Dan Coast, IB Coordinator at Mount Vernon High School

I am writing this piece after reading Jay Matthews' 2003 Challenge Index for the Washington-area schools. It was published in the Fairfax Extra section of the Washington Post on December 4th, 2003. Reporter Jay Matthews ranks each school using a simple formula. He takes the number of college-level tests, such as AP or IB exams, taken at each school in 2003 and divides that number by the number of graduating seniors.

MVHS is ranked 69th out of the 157 Washington-area schools included in the Challenge Index. A careful review of the Challenge Index indicates:

Mount Vernon has a Challenge Index ranking of 1.256, placing it in the top 4% of schools in the nation that challenge their students to take IB or AP exams.

Of the students at Mount Vernon High School, 43% receive a lunch subsidy. The Challenge Index report includes these data because "the number of subsidized-lunch applicants is a rough indicator of socio-economic factors that may affect student interest in college-level courses." So, if you review the list of the 157 Washington-area schools cited in the study, you will find only 20 schools have 40% or more of their student body on lunch subsidies. The MVHS Challenge Index ranking is 3rd among this subset of schools.

The International Baccalaureate Program at Mount Vernon High School continues to be one the many things at our school that makes this a special place for the students in our community.

Letter To The Editor:

Dear Editor,

I'd like to have this published in the next issue of the Needle and a survey about the trash pick up issue. I think that the Board needs to get other bids for the upcoming 2004 trash collection.

I particularly want to complain about an issue I have had with the current trash company. I had an old student desk that I was throwing out. I know that bulk items must have a special request for pick up, so my husband and I cut the desk up and placed it in a large black trash bag and the trash company left the bag in front of my house.

I was told when I first moved here that the association fee covers trash collection, so would someone explain to me why we should have pay extra for bulk items. We've never had to do so in the past and I don't want to have to do so now. I'm going to be contacting a legal advisor about the legality of this issue. If trash collection is covered by the fee then I shouldn't have to pay extra for the special items as told we would have to do so when we went with the new contract. I'd like to get some feedback on this issue from the rest of the owners in Pinewood Lakes.

Response:

Dear Ms. Offord:

The Board understands your concern about having to pay for the bulk items to be hauled away. However, the community needs to realize the following sequence of events.

1. In late August 2003 our previous trash contractor, BFI, terminated service (in violation of their contract) on less than one week's notice. The Board is currently engaged in legal action to recoup its additional expenses.

2. In that short period, the Community Manager requested bids, but received responses from only three small firms. Champion, the current vendor, was the most reputable firm that bid, and its bid, at a constant price for three years, *allowed the Board to accept its offer without having to ask the homeowners to approve a steep assessment increase.*

The difference between the Association's contract with Champion and our contract with

other trash collectors is that they charge homeowners for all bulk pickup. Previous vendors also charged homeowners, but only for large items, such as appliances. However, even BFI, by the terms of its contract, could have charged homeowners for more types of bulk items than it did.

The trash industry today is under increasing financial pressure. It must pay ever higher salaries to retain qualified operators and prevent harmful turnover. It is facing higher capital investments to meet new EPA and OSHA requirements, and more stringent county requirements on segregation of types of trash. Finally, its rate must more than cover the landfill fees that Fairfax County charges. When a company bids on a contract, it makes assumptions about how much trash a community generates, because landfill fees are based on the tonnage of trash brought to the landfill.



Pinewood Lake is increasingly seen as a community that generates an above average amount of trash. That means we can expect to see higher rates when the current contract expires in 2006. With a company like Champion that charges a lesser amount than large companies, but requires separate payment for bulk items, the Board has a difficult decision to make, i.e., *does it keep assessment increases within the rate of cost of living changes and ask individual homeowners to bear the cost of their bulk pickups, or does it spread the cost of bulk pickups among all homeowners and drastically increase assessments?*

The Board currently feels that it is more just to make the small minority who require bulk pickups to bear that cost, rather than saddle that expense on all homeowners. In response, though, to complaints like yours, the Board has solicited other bids. Without revealing their contents, we can say that accepting any of them, would require the Board to call a special meeting of the Association to approve an assessment increase above the cost of living index (CPI) of up to \$4 per month. The Board will continue to monitor this issue.

It's January 2004 - a new year's work is about to begin!

The Maintenance Committee will be planning to program a number of projects in 2004, such as:

➤➤➤ Road projects, such as resurfacing a part of Arendale Square, drainage on the access road on Central Park Drive, and a number of street sealant projects to be determined. Also we will be reviewing more paths to be resurfaced and take another look at the surfaces of Saint Annes Court.

➤➤➤ Additional lake work . . . shoreline restoration, fence work below the dam and landscaping in various areas around the lake.

➤➤➤ Redo the office . . . rearrange the existing space, re-carpet, correct a drainage problem and do some landscaping work.

➤➤➤ Begin review and installation of new outdoor lighting fixtures throughout the community.

➤➤➤ Investigate and plan a redesign of

More Harry Houseowner Hints

Fireplace owners ~

~ Close the flue during the daytime or when the fire is out. A chimney draws air out and can draw warm air out of your house even when the fire is not lit.

~ Be careful with your ashes!!! Don't clean out your fireplace until the fire has been out for sometime. Warm ashes may still have a spark in them and cause a fire. DO NOT use a plastic container to hold ashes - they are combustible. Use a metal can with a tight fitting lid to remove ashes and store out of doors.

~ Don't throw your ashes in the trash. Recycle them!!! They are an excellent source of potash for your lawn. Scatter them on your grass areas. No! ashes will not burn your grass. (PS - they also are good to scatter on icy areas, but don't put them where they will be tracked back in the house. Also, be careful if you have pets, the ashes can irritate their paws.)

Leaves!!! If you have leaves on your grass areas, rake them up when ever possible. Matted leaves will smother out grass and you will end up with dead areas in your lawn.

And if it is a warm winter - you can still plant bulbs for spring blooming!

SNOW REMOVAL PLAN

On all streets in Area 2 (North of Lawrence Street) and those streets with service roads, the snow will be plowed to the curb side, away from the houses. On streets with cul-de-sacs, namely Birchlake, Cedarlake, Oaklake, and Pinelake, all snow will be plowed to the far end of the cul-de-sacs, instead of being piled in the middle of the street as in past winters.

There are many non-operational vehicles parked on the streets of Pinewood Lake.
